


Background in Fire

- Partner with state and federal agencies, private industry, other NGOs and private land owners



Scaling up

To increase the acreage treated with fire ...

Need:

Increased prescribed fire training and experience among practitioners

Increased availability of fire trained staff

More opportunities to demonstrate competencies on wildfire assignments

Prescribed Fire Training Exchanges



- Mobilize taskforce
- Orient to state laws, ecology, equipment and local prescribed fire culture
- Develop crew cohesion
- Emphasis on trainees
- Complete burns—start small, increase complexity



Prescribed Fire Training Exchanges

- Schedule burns for every day
- Let trainees practice
- Prep, scout, burn, monitor, document, hold, mop-up, patrol, secure & extinguish







Simultaneously fill several needs





- Professional credentials
- Provide broad perspective
- Build private capacity
- Complete large, complex burns



Over the Last 5 years

Burning and learning together over the last 5 years has resulted in:

- 68,000 acres of prescribed fire
- 435 participants
- 45 burn boss trainees and 112 singleresource boss trainees from across the country gain experience and evaluations needed for professional advancement







Bring people into the fold





- Integrate private, county, state and federal fire practitioners
- Partner with universities
- Local participants
 develop skills and
 abilities they can use
 after we leave
- Basic fireline safety courses (S-130/190)



Lessons Learned







- Burning with your neighbors can multiply capacity
- Landscapes that need fire also need people who use fire
- No shortcuts: prescribed fire requires time and effort
- Qualified staff take years to develop—so share with others
- Show up, even if you have other priorities



Lessons Learned



- Use local/national agreements
- Empower non-traditional partners
- Use self-study, crosswalk tools




- Two-week duration works well
- Dedicate staff to fire du during burn windows
- Focus on the training
- Keep at it
